

In 2020 and 2021, 7 samplings were carried out with park staff, soldiers and volunteers.






# Protocol to monitor the impacts of marine litter on beaches.





- 168 types of garbage grouped into 11 categories.
- 98% of the collected waste were plastic.
- 30% of the collected plastics were SUPs.
- 32% marine litter originates from tourism and recreational activities in áreas beyond the park significant jurisdiction.
- 55% of the waste collected, the origin could not be identified

Setting up a scheme to phase out the use of single use plastics








# Audits of the waste bin of the park's staff and the park's canteen

- In July 2020 a total of 10.3 Kg of plastic were classified:
- 7.6 Kg from the waste bin of the park's staff container and 2.7 Kg from the waste bin of the park's canteen container
- 41% of the total litter recorded in the waste bin of park's staff were SUPs.
- 61% of the total litter recorded in the waste bin of the park's canteen were SUPs.










## **Best practices for replacing SUPs**

- Cleaning products in bulk to reduce packaging waste
- Installing 9 water dispensers to minimize the amount of plastic water bottles used



 In the case of the SUPs used in the canteen, these were replaced by porcelain tableware. Compostable or cardboard plates, cutlery and cups are provided, when needed.

### Park Staff and Volunteer Training

- Several workshops were held during the pilot action.
- Wide- ranging stakeholders, including park's staff members, coast guards, skippers, guides, maintenance personnel, soldiers, students and volunteers.
- More than 70 participants obtained new knowledge and skills related to marine litter monitoring methodologies, ML prevention and mitigation options and best practices on SUPs reduction.





- Invite other interested parties that share the vision and commitment of the network to join the network.



#### **Lessons Learned**

- Even pristine and most protected marine areas are afected by marine litter. Marine biota it's exposed to toxicity by chemicals coming from plastic degradation.
- Most of the marine litter collected in Cabrera is plastic and mainly comes from recreational and touristic activities.
- Educational activities, and citizen science actions provides a powerful tool for mobilizing and engaging local communities and visitors in the collective fight against marine litter.
- Changes in consumption can yield lasting results, decrasing the amount of waste that turns into marine litter.
- Sharing experiences and lessons learned with other administrations can be instrumental to increase the impact of current actions.

# Continuity to reach long-standing impact

- Annual audits in the plastic waste bin to monitor the efectiveness of the mesures put in place.
- Promote good practices for vistors.
- Quarterly marine litter monitoring campaigns on beaches with simplified methodological protocols deployed.
- Incorporate the cost of the Plastic Buster Kit in the park anual budget to give the kit to the staff every year.
- Joint collaboration between park staff, military personnel, divers and volunteers. We need to work collectivly, hand-by-hand.
